For You, O God, have tested us; You have refined us as silver is refined . Psalm 66:10

A talented violinist was scheduled to play before a very critical audience. Although she had a fine instrument, she was not satisfied with the quality of its sound. So she said to her father, "This violin must yield its full resonance and vibration of tone. I'm going out to buy some tested strings."

When asked what tested strings were, she replied, "First they're put on a rack and stretched and strained to take all the vacillation out of them. Then they are hammered and put through an acid test. This is what enables them to produce a perfect and full tone." When she attached the tested strings and tuned the instrument, the music was noticeably more warm and rich than before.

If our lives are going to produce beautiful music for the Lord, testing is imperative. We all tend to vacillate. Sometimes we are up, sometimes we are down. Sometimes we are hot, sometimes we are cold. This hinders the spiritual tone God desires. Although we don't enjoy the stretch, the strain, and the stress, what God-honoring results they can produce!

Just as a tested string gives the highest quality of sound, so Christians who accept their trials and learn to profit from them are able to bring the greatest glory to the Master Musician.

ARE WE LIVING IN THE LAST DAYS...?

Lately I have been hearing people talk about all the "stuff" that's going on in the world, and ask the infamous question... "Will now be the time that Jesus will return?... I mean, it can't get much worse, can it?" The Bible does give us some very black-and-white things to say in moments like these. I usually respond that we cannot know the year, and that even Jesus Himself, when He was on earth, said that He didn't know the exact time when He would be coming back (Matthew 24:36; Mark 13:32). I also take the opportunity to emphasize that if anyone says that he knows, that person is false. Then I add that even though I don't know what year Jesus is coming back, I do know that his coming is near. And by "near," I mean what the New Testament means when it tells us, multiple times, that His coming is near.

We are excited here at Woodville Community, because at New Year's and throughout the winter we will be delving into the mysteries given to us in the book of Revelation in a new series called, "Escape the Coming Night." We will be going through the letters to the seven churches in our Wednesday Night Service as well. Throughout this series, we will look closely at the time of the rapture of the church and the judgments that follow. This will be a time of deep reflection upon us as a culture, as well as our own personal lives. Until that time, we have some thoughts about what we can know about Christ's return.

The Next Big Thing

God calls His church, in every generation, to live in light of this remarkable truth: Nothing now stands in the way of Jesus's return. After His perfect life, sacrificial death for us, resurrection from the grave, and ascension to heaven to pour out His Spirit on His church, the next major movement in the history of the world is the second coming of Christ.

In the church age, we Christians have no definite unfulfilled list of events which must transpire before His return. What the Bible promises will happen at the end is already happening, in significant measure, around the world today — and has been happening, in some sense, since the earliest days of the church.

As long as Jesus tarries, we do indeed have the concrete directives of the church age to continue pursuing, like the evangelization of the nations (Matthew 28:19) and the hastening of his coming through holy living (2 Peter 3:11–12). And yet we have no firm, certain list of unfulfilled conditions about which Jesus could not surprise us. His coming is the next big thing and could happen at any moment. That's what the New Testament means when it says his return is *near*.

Could Jesus Come Back Today?

As early as Acts 2:17, just after Jesus had ascended to heaven and poured out His Spirit on His church, Peter declares that the "last days" prophecy from Joel 2 is being fulfilled in their midst: "In the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh." Then Paul writes in 2 Timothy 3:1, "Understand this, that in the last days there will come times of difficulty." And the times of difficulty he refers to were already happening for his readers. He was saying, in effect, "Don't be surprised that life is tough; these are the last days, remember?" And 2 Peter 3:3 makes a similar assumption and gives a similar reminder: "Scoffers will come in the last days with scoffing, following their own sinful desires." For Peter's readers, and for us, the scoffers aren't future; they are here now. We are living in the last days.

Perhaps most prominent of all, and unmistakable, are the first two verses of Hebrews: "Long ago, at many times and in many ways, God spoke to our fathers by the prophets, but in these last days He has spoken to us by His Son." The first coming of Christ ushered in this final season of world history — these last days — and His second coming is the next major step in history. Unlike many other major systems of belief around the world, Jews and Christians view history as linear.

History is God's story, and it is going somewhere. It had a beginning, and it will have an end. There were first days, there were the days of the patriarchs and the many seasons (so many ups and downs!) in the history of Israel, and there were four hundred years of prophetic silence, and then the days Jesus walked the earth.

And since then, we have been living in the last days. We don't know how long this present season of history will last. It has been almost two thousand years so far. But we do know that this present season of history, which began with the early church, is the last one until Jesus comes.

The next major, literally epoch-making event to come is not some especially great persecution (as if Christians haven't been persecuted for the last two thousand years and aren't being persecuted in horrible ways around the world today); the next big step is that Jesus is coming back. That's what the New Testament means when it says His return is "near" or "at hand." It's not about shortness of time as we conceive of it, but about nearness in history as God crafts it. And it should make us a people who anticipate it, pray for it, and live in light of it.

The second coming of Christ is near. This is what we teach our children, and remind ourselves. We are living in the last days.




Woodville Community Church Christmas Eve Service



Encourage our *pastoral staff* when ministry gets tough. Help them remain faithful with the things You've entrusted to them (2 Cor. 4:1; 1 Cor. 4:1-3).

Teach us to respect and honor our *elders/deacons*. May they give wholehearted attention to prayer and ministry. Keep them devoted to their families and above reproach. May they be gentle, honest, and wise as they carry out their responsibilities (Acts 6:4; 1 Tim. 3:1-2, 5:17; Titus 1:7).

Cheese Ball

Prep 15 m Ready In 2 h 15 m

Ingredients

2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened

3 1/2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

1 (1 ounce) package Ranch-style dressing mix

2 cups chopped pecans

4 pecan halves

Directions

In a large bowl, mix together cream cheese, Cheddar cheese, and dressing mix. Form into one large ball or two smaller balls. Roll in chopped pecans to coat surface. Decorate the top with pecan halves. Refrigerate for at least 2 hours, or overnight.

Prep 1 h Cook 45 m Ready In 1 h 50 m

Ingredients

2 (8 ounce) packages corn bread mix

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 pound spicy pork sausage

2 onions, chopped

2 apples, cored and chopped

4 stalks celery, diced

3/4 cup chicken broth

1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

2 teaspoons rubbed sage

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme

1/2 teaspoon dried rosemary

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper



Directions

Bake cornbread according to package directions. Cool and crumble into a large bowl.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat.

Cook sausage until brown and crumbly, remove from the skillet but keep the oil in the pan. Add onions, apples and celery; cook stirring occasionally until tender, about 5 minutes.


Toss the cooked mixture and the sausage into the bowl with the crumbled cornbread. Stir in the chicken broth and melted butter. Season with parsley, sage, thyme, rosemary, salt and pepper.

Blend well and press into a 9x13 inch baking dish.

Bake in the preheated oven for 35 to 45 minutes.

Nebraska-


