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
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True Authority Over Sin

"But so that you know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins," then He said to the paralytic, "Get up, pick up your bed and go home." And he got up and went home. Matthew 9: 6-7

It's not unheard of for people to trap themselves by their own theology and logic. That's what happened with the scribes and Pharisees during this episode. They believed that disease and physical suffering were results of sin, and that removing the disease would equate with removing the sin that caused it. By that reasoning, all healing would have to include at least some forgiveness of sin- which only God can give. Jesus used this logic to prove a crucial point.

The point: "The Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins." Essentially the Lord says, "I will again demonstrate My power to heal disease. There may be no tangible results of my forgiveness, but there are tangible, visible results when I heal." If, in the minds of the Jews, disease and sin are always connected, then it follows that healing and forgiveness are always connected. Therefore, so they might know He could forgive sin in the heart, which is unseen, Christ would do what they could see - heal the physical side-effects of sin, as represented by the paralytic.

Causing the man to walk would be proof to everyone present of Jesus's complete authority over sin and its effects - less spectacular but just as convincing as seeing demon-filled swine run off the cliff and into the sea at our Lord's behest.

At Christ's command the man "got up and went home," an action that was a living proof of the Son's authority over infirmities and sin.

Ask Yourself

How does Jesus continually prove to you that His forgiveness of your sins is authentic and complete? What Scriptures give you assurance when your feelings tell you otherwise?

A Different Perspective on Leadership

Leadership is a subject that is popular in the American culture these days. There are plenty of books out there offering ideas of what a "successful" leader looks like and how it can be accomplished. This interest has even found its way into the twenty-first century church in America. Christian authors have spent considerable time figuring out ways of marketing the church to run like an effective business model, promising (in not so many words) how your church too can be more "successful" by following their principles. Joe Stowell, president of Cornerstone University in Grand Rapids, Michigan, has given some thought-provoking insights on the leadership frenzy. All too often, we think of leadership from the perspective of...well, leading! How about a different perspective?

Let's face it, if you are a follower in a world that celebrates leaders, you don't feel all that good about yourself all that often. Walk into any bookstore, and you will note that many of the bestsellers are about how to be a great leader or how to make something of your life. Bestsellers are written by people who became successful by doing their own thing. Entrepreneurs are lauded for their independence and "out of the box" thinking. But nobody seems to notice *followers*, which makes being an authentic Christian an interesting challenge.

When Jesus called His inner circle to join His cause, He didn't lure them by offering them great positions of leadership and notoriety. In fact, quite the opposite: He recruited them to be followers. And it needs to be noted that in spite of the bad press that following gets, He had no trouble building His team. He was so compelling that rugged fishermen, a greedy tax collector, a tough member of the resistance force, capable women, and many others left everything to become His followers. When He called them, He offered no conditions. No negotiations. No particulars. No contractual exceptions or arrangements. All He asked was that they follow. Those who responded to the call never saw it as a demotion. For them it was an honor!

But would it be an honor for you? After all, it sounds more like losing than winning. It feels like losing control, like losing the potential of managing your own life the way you want to manage it.

That's exactly what following Jesus is all about! When He called the disciples, He framed it like this: "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." (Matthew 4:19) In essence He is saying, "Follow Me, and let Me make something of your life." Most of us want to make something of our lives on our own terms and are happy to fit Jesus into the picture now and then. But that's not the way it works, and thankfully so. Left to ourselves, we tend to mess things up. Or, if we succeed, we become proud and consume time and energy reaching for the next golden ring, only to find that ultimately "the good life" is either illusive or unfulfilling.

It makes a lot of sense to give Jesus His well-deserved chance at being in charge. After all, He is smarter than we are, and since He has already proven how much He loves us, we know we can trust Him implicitly. He has our best in mind.

So what does following Jesus look like? It's like the old "follow the leader" game we used to play as kids — with the Leader out in front, and His followers walking behind Him, doing whatever He does and going wherever He leads. We are to be following His example of forgiveness, truth, righteous attitudes and actions, honesty with ourselves and others, integrity, serving even at risk and loss to ourselves, loving our enemies, caring for the needy and the poor, loving the losers, and generously extending grace and mercy to the undeserving.

Letting Jesus make something of our lives is a plan worth implementing. The outcomes are so rewarding that it makes following a worthy pursuit. Your relationships, family, career, and even your leisure will all be more successful if you approach every situation as an opportunity to be a follower of Jesus. And, by the way, those who are called to lead are not exempt. Leadership that begins by following Christ is far more effective. When He looks over His shoulder, be there!

Food For Thought...

Creamy Turkey Tetrazzini

What a great way to use up leftover turkey!

This casserole bakes up delicious and bubbly for a wonderful main course.

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 25 min. Bake: 50 min. YIELD: 8 servings.

Ingredients

1 package (1 pound) linguine

6 tablespoons butter

6 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

3 cups chicken broth

1 cup heavy whipping cream

4 cups cubed cooked turkey

1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms

1 jar (4 ounces) diced pimientos, drained

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

4 to 5 drops hot pepper sauce

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese



Directions

- 1. Cook pasta according to package directions. In a large saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Stir in the flour, salt, pepper and cayenne until smooth. Gradually add broth. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from the heat; stir in cream.
- 2. Drain linguine; add 2 cups sauce and toss to coat. Transfer to a greased 13x9-in. baking dish. Make a well in center of pasta, making a space about 6x4 in.
- 3. To the remaining sauce, add the turkey, mushrooms, pimientos, parsley and pepper sauce; mix well. Pour into center of dish. Sprinkle with cheese.
- 4. Cover and bake at 350° for 30 minutes. Uncover; bake until bubbly and heated through, 20-30 minutes longer.

Pumpkin Bisque with Smoked Gouda

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 20 min. Cook: 35 min. **YIELD:** 9 servings (2-1/4 quarts).

Ingredients

4 bacon strips, chopped

1 medium onion, chopped

3 garlic cloves, minced

6 cups chicken broth

1 can (29 ounces) solid-pack pumpkin

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1 cup heavy whipping cream

1 cup shredded Gouda cheese

2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley

Additional shredded Gouda cheese, optional

Directions

- In a Dutch oven, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp. Remove to paper towels with a slotted spoon; drain, reserving 1 tablespoon drippings. Sauté onion in drippings until tender. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer.
- Stir in the broth, pumpkin, salt, nutmeg and pepper.
 Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes. Cool slightly.
- 3. In a blender, process soup in batches until smooth. Return all to pan. Stir in cream; heat through. Add cheese; stir until melted. Sprinkle each serving with parsley, bacon and, if desired, additional cheese.
