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A THANKSGIVING DEVOTION

Philippians 4:6 Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.

I've never cooked a big <u>meal</u> for anyone, but I've watched my wife Evelyn prepare everything in advance – making the grocery list, setting the table, buying the groceries, preparing the food, cooking the meal, and beautifully presenting it to the whole family. I enjoy her cooking and marvel at how well she plans it in advance. I know she gets anxious about making everything perfect, but in the end, it's always a wonderful meal and a great dinner.

The Internet is NOT your Church

The COVID-19 shutdowns have created a renewed interest in virtual church services. What was once a temporary solution in the early days of the quarantine has become the preferred method for many. We believe that trend poses a danger to the church and to her members. When COVID first came on the scene, churches closed because we did not know the seriousness of the disease. For seven weeks, Woodville Community Church, like many others, took the necessary precautions to ensure people's safety. We knew going in that it was not good for the church to be separated. We were very grateful that we had the technology to be able to put our services on the internet for the congregation to watch or listen to. We also knew that this could be a double-edged sword going forward.

Many larger churches have been gateways for people all over the world, to watch each Sunday. One such church, pastored by John MacArthur, has an online ministry called Grace to You. John was concerned that though his messages were well listened to all over the world, there was a danger that his ministry could be mistaken for replacing a local church assembly. Notice their church's concerns over this:

"But we also know our limitations. Grace to You is not a local church, nor can we function in its place. We can't offer the face-to-face fellowship you'll find in a church. We can't provide pastoral care, counseling, or visitations. And we can't perform church discipline on those who are straying from the faith. Our ministry is meant to be a supplement to the local church—not a substitute for it. That's why we are alarmed every time we hear someone declare that Grace to You is their local church—with John MacArthur as their downloadable cyber-pastor."

Most of the people who replace their local church with other outside ministries do so reluctantly. They see it as the last option in a seemingly futile quest for a sound biblical congregation. And their grievance has plenty of merit. For some, they had to vote with their feet when their once-sound church slid into apostasy. Others simply become aware—through the sanctifying work of the Spirit—that they've been taking in a steady stream of heresy and have to remove themselves from its influence. There are some who come to saving faith through a parachurch ministry like Grace to You or other large church options, but struggle to find a local body of believers where the gospel they've believed is clearly proclaimed. But all of this is no excuse for substituting ministries like Grace to You for the local church.

Why We Need a Good Church

Spiritual lone rangers are nothing new. The author of Hebrews warned against that very thing: Hebrews 10:25 forbids "forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some." Even in the earliest days of the church, people had a faltering commitment to the Body of Christ. The writer is telling them that one of the best ways to hold fast to the things of God—the real things of God that are found only in the New Covenant of Jesus Christ—is to be in the fellowship of His people, where they could love and be loved, serve and be served. The local church matters for assurance. "By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). Our ability to love our brethren is demonstrated through interaction with other believers—especially those we find it difficult to love.

The local church also matters for *accountability*. Spiritual solitude often leads to overlooked and unchecked sin. The fellowship of the saints and the practice of church discipline are safeguards to our purity and spiritual growth. Moreover, our fallen propensity to interpret Scripture according to our own preferences is reined in by the oversight of faithful shepherds. A healthy local church, led by a plurality of godly elders, protects us from popish tyranny and sectarian isolation. Most importantly, the local church matters for *spiritual survival*. All Christians are designed to function as members of the larger Body of Christ:

For even as the body is one and yet has many members, and all the members of the body, though they are many, are one body, so also is Christ. For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free, and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. For the body is not one member, but many. (1 Corinthians 12:12–14; cf. Romans 12:4–6).

Organs and limbs cannot survive disconnected from the body. The same goes for people who sever themselves—and their families—from the Body of Christ. It's clear all Christians need a solid local church. The real difficult part comes when we try to get back those people who have gotten into the habit of not meeting in their local assembly. As with all disciplines of the Christian faith, we need the reminder and encouragement from godly leaders to return to their churches and continue to trust God through the uncertainties of a changing world.

I met Bernandette there and we married in 1989 and then we went to seminary at the International School of Theology (Cru connected seminary).



- ABORTION KILLS CHILDREN



Food For Thought...

Savory Pumpkin Soup with Spice Shake

INGREDIENTS

Soup

1/4 c. olive oil

1 sweet onion, chopped

1 red bell pepper, seeded and chopped

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 cloves garlic, chopped

1 tbsp. chili powder

2 tsp. dried oregano

2 (15-ounce) cans pure pumpkin puree

2 qt. vegetable broth

3 tbsp. fresh lime juice

Spice Shake, for serving

Spice Shake

2 tbsp. whole cumin seeds

2 tbsp. whole fennel seeds

2 tbsp. whole coriander seeds

1 c. toasted pepitas

2 tsp. crushed red pepper

1 tsp. kosher salt

YIELDS:**8** SERVINGS TOTAL TIME:**1** HOUR **5** MINS

DIRECTIONS

Make the soup: Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add onion and bell pepper. Season with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until onion is soft, 8 to 10 minutes. Add garlic, chili powder, and oregano. Cook, stirring, until fragrant, about 30 seconds.

1.Add pumpkin puree and broth. Cook, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened, 25 to 30 minutes. Working in batches, puree soup in a blender until smooth. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in lime juice just before serving. Serve with Spice Shake alongside.

1.Make the Spice Shake: Cook 2 tbsp. each whole cumin seeds, whole fennel seeds, and whole coriander seeds in a small skillet over low heat, stirring, until fragrant, 1 to 2 minutes; transfer to a bowl. Add 1 cup toasted pepitas, 2 teaspoons crushed red pepper, and 1 teaspoon kosher salt. *Makes 1 2/3 cups*.

Roasted Butternut Squash with Cider Vinaigrette



INGREDIENTS

2 small butternut squash (about 1 1/2 pounds each), peeled, seeded, and cut into 1/2-inch-thick slices

1 medium red onion, cut into wedges

3 tbsp. olive oil, divided

kosher salt

freshly ground black pepper

1 c. apple cider

1 1/2 tbsp. whole-grain mustard

1 tbsp. red wine vinegar

2 tbsp. chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

YIELDS:**6** SERVINGS TOTAL TIME:**0** HOURS **40** MINS

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°F. Toss squash and onion with 2 tablespoons oil on two rimmed baking sheets. Season with salt and pepper. Roast, rotating pans once, until golden brown and tender, 20 to 25 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, bring cider to a boil in a small saucepan over high heat. Reduce heat to low and gently simmer until liquid has reduced to 3 tablespoons, 12 to 15 minutes.
- 3. Whisk together mustard, vinegar, reduced cider, and remaining 1 tablespoon oil in a bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in parsley.
- 4. Drizzle squash and onion with vinaigrette just before serving.
